

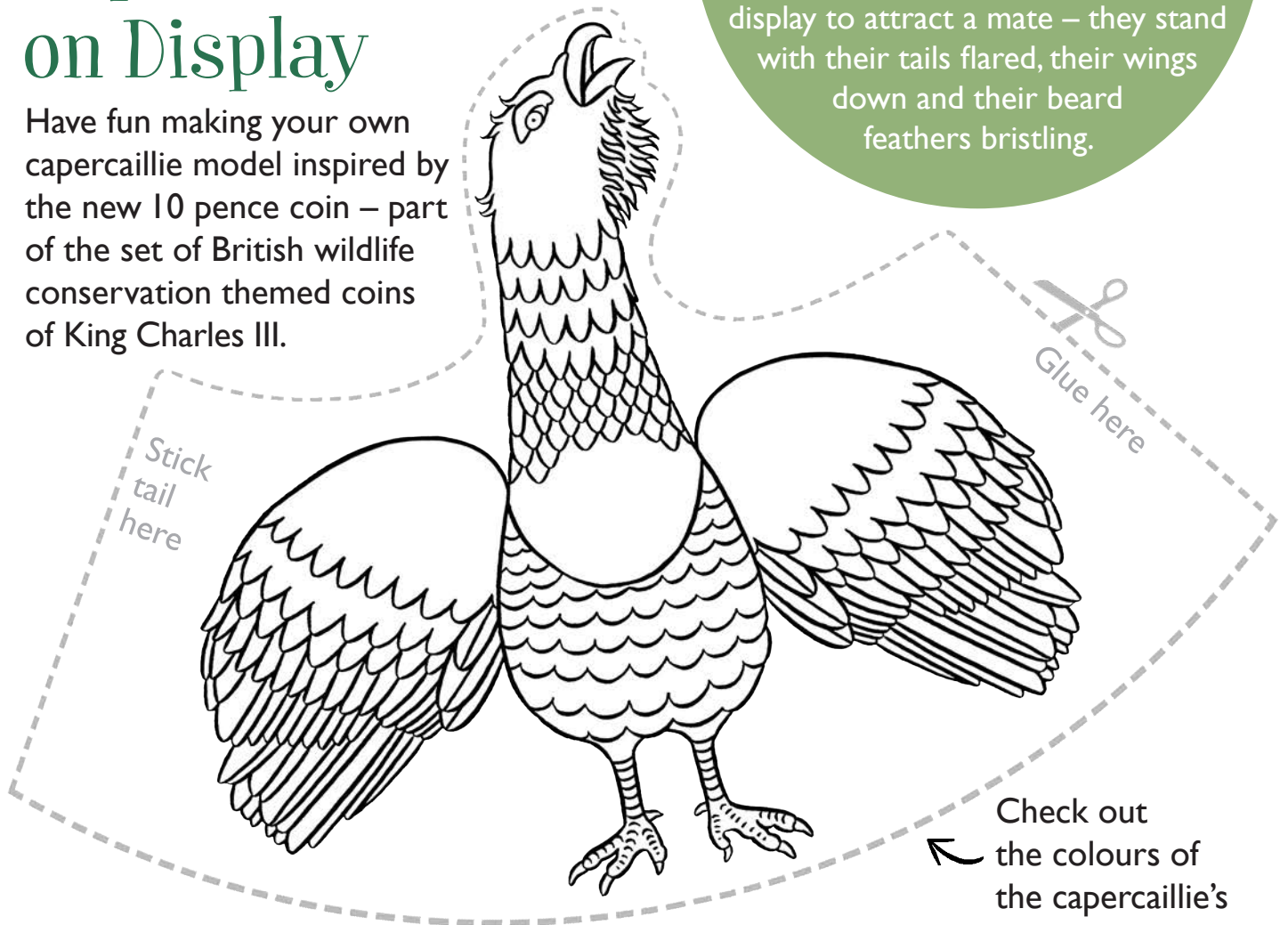

Capercaillie on Display

Have fun making your own capercaillie model inspired by the new 10 pence coin – part of the set of British wildlife conservation themed coins of King Charles III.

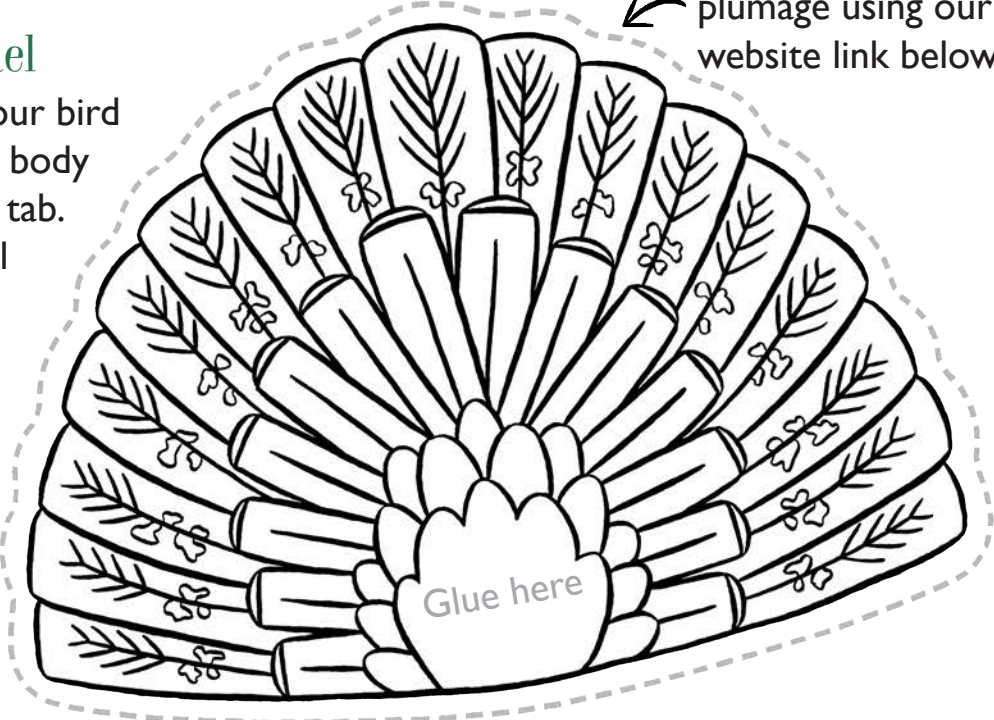
Did you know?
The capercaillie lives in the old pine forests of Northern Scotland. Its name means 'horse of the forest' in Scottish Gaelic. Male birds put on a courtship display to attract a mate – they stand with their tails flared, their wings down and their beard feathers bristling.



Make your own model

Colour in and cut out your bird model pieces. Curve the body into a cone and glue the tab. Lastly, stick the flared tail to the back of the cone.
